



This week Nursery have continued to read a story called The Very Hungry Caterpillar. The children learnt the life cycle of a butterfly and knew from the story that the caterpillar began as a little egg on a leaf, then out popped the caterpillar and it made a cocoon. They also knew that the caterpillar emerged from the cocoon as a butterfly.



This week the children made shape butterflies and revised learning the names of 2D shapes including squares, circles, rectangles and triangles. They also used a mirror to help them to make each side of the butterfly's wings symmetrical.



This week the children have been sequencing pictures of the story called The Very Hungry Caterpillar to show what happened at the beginning, middle and end of the story. The children then used this to help them to retell the story.



Homework Bag Reminder




This week a group of children will take a homework bag home on Friday. This needs to be returned on the following Monday. Please check that all of the pieces are in the bag when it is returned.
